Deuteronomy 17:14-20; 1 Samuel 8:7, 10-22; 10:17-19; 12:1, 19-25

Part II

I. Introduction

This was explained last week - It is interesting to read and reflect on how faithful the Lord reigning as Israel's King, destroying anyone or nation in their path, from one war to the next, is treated with such little respect once Israel entered the Promised Land; again please note they could not attain this if it were not for His faithful commitment to serve them as their king as a result of His promise to Abraham, a righteous man (He warned them; Deut. 8:11-20). The Red Sea swallowed the most powerful army; He protected them from every disease or wild animal, while feeding and caring for them in the wilderness; a place where they could not grow anything to eat, no doctors to care for them, and too hot to survive. He tore down the walls of Jericho and defeated giants in the Promised Land, and once they had the best Warrior ever, the best Provider, the best Protector, and the best Deliverer, they wanted another king (1 Sam. 8:7; 12:1). No wonder God said; *"It is not for your righteousness or for the uprightness of your heart that you are going to possess their land, but it is because of the wickedness of these nations that the Lord your God is driving them out before you, in order to confirm the oath which the Lord swore to your fathers, to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Know, then, it is not because of your righteousness that the Lord your God is giving you this good land to possess, for you are a stubborn people."* (Deut. 9:5-6; NASU)

We are no different in the New Testament. We are described as lost (Luke 19:10), enslaved people to sin (just like Israel had too powerful an enemy to get out of slavery, so are we in relation to Satan), living in darkness, full of hate (John 3:19-21), learning to lean more to our intelligence than God's Word. As a result, the world grows more evil and depraved (Rom. 1:18-32), while in the building of our wealth, or our ability to learn how to survive we forsake God and depend on politicians.

Christ, who is the head of the church, instructs us to abide in Him (John 15:1-17) by renewing our minds (Rom. 12:2) with a commitment to be devoted to His Word (Acts 2:42), as we build His church using our spiritual gifts (Eph. 4:7-16), for His glory (1 Cor. 12:4-8) and honor. As head of the church, He instructs us that this is His mechanism for impacting the world (Eph. 1:22-23), protecting us from Satan (Eph. 3:10), healing us from disease (James 5:13-18), and strengthening us to overcome challenges each day. This takes place when we empower His church and live as salt and light in the world (Matt. 5:13-16). Yet we forsake the assembling of ourselves together, struggle to find time to serve, become upset when we are challenged to give to build His Kingdom, are quick to become upset when things don't go our way, and do not go back to church while being extremely devoted to political parties. We view them as leaders who rescue us from the evil of our enemies, financial difficulties, and our social agendas. We are no different than Israel.

II. How Does God Feel About Their Decision to Have a King

- A. God views our choice to forsake His rule over us as a rejection of Him (1 Sam. 8:7; 10:19). This is why He refuses to answer our prayers (1 Sam. 8:17).
 - 1. God saw that the people willfully and purposefully no longer wanted Him to reign over them (1 Sam. 8:7, 12:1). God had Samuel repeat this over and over. It must have been deeply offensive.
 - 2. There is hope; *"Now therefore, present yourselves before the Lord by your tribes and by your clans."* (1 Sam. 10:19c).
- B. He felt insulted (1 Sam. 12:12) after everything He willingly did for a people who did not even qualify to be called by Him (Deut. 9:5-6).
- C. Even though God allowed them to select a king and demanded He determine who would be their king (Deut. 17:15), God viewed the king of their choice as their king (1 Sam. 12:25b).
- D. God viewed their choice for a king as forsaking Him to other gods (1 Sam. 8:8).
 - 1. A god is anything or person we are willing to serve more than we serve God, give to more than we give to God, and submit to more than we submit to the will of God.

III. God's Warnings When We Choose a New King

Deuteronomy 17:14-20; 1 Samuel 8:10-22

- A. The person who rules must not be self-serving (Deut. 17:16).
- B. The person who rules must not be a womanizer (Deut. 17:17).
- C. Must not be lifted in pride (Deut. 17:20).
- D. Sons and daughters will serve his agenda and will be used at his discretion, which would include sending them to war with no guarantee (1 Sam. 8:11). When God is their King different results:
 - 1. When Moses led Israel, God defeated their enemies whenever Moses raised his hands (Ex. 17:8-16)
 - 2. Israel fought Sihon, king of the Amorites, and God gave them victory (Numbers 21:21-24).
 - 3. No lives were lost at the Red Sea and no one needed to fight against the Egyptians (Ex. 14:13-20).
 - 4. When a king obeyed God's commands in Deuteronomy 17:19-20, God gave Israel victory without requiring them to fight (2 Chron. 20:15, 21-24).
- a) The same took place with Hezekiah (2 Kings 18-19).
- E. When it comes to our children serving them, it said he will 'take them' – there will be a draft (Deut. 8:11).
- F. Our children will work for him to enrich him and serve for his enjoyment (1 Sam. 8:12-13, 16).
- G. "He will take the best of your fields and your vineyards and your olive groves and give them to his servants." (1 Sam 8:14; NASU)
 - 1. Take the best of the fields. Have the best land for their profit.
 - 2. Deplete households of their wealth (vs. 16).

- H. They were not willing to pay their tithes, so now they had to pay the king, who took a tenth of everything they produced; this is on top of what is said in 'G'. (1 Sam. 8:15, 16-17).
1. A tenth of the seed to pay government staff (vs. 15).
 2. A tenth of the flocks (vs. 17).
 3. We will pay the government 20% of our income while we complain about God's request for 10% to build His Kingdom.
- I. Instead of serving God, we will serve the government (1 Sam. 8:17).
- J. There will be no distinctiveness between us and those who are unsaved (1 Sam. 8:20). We will become just like them.
- K. The politicians will become a burden to us, and when we cry to God for help, He will not listen (1 Sam. 8:18).
